The Rathdrum Prairie/Spokane Valley Aquifer is the sole source of drinking water for more than 400,000 people. Protecting our water supply from contamination is important for the public health and economic vitality of this region

Based on information from local, state, or federal data sources, we have determined that has a potential to harm groundwater quality should the critical materials associated with your facility be released into the environment. This letter provides information about the Wellhead Protection Program and serves notification that is located within a wellhead protection area associated with one or more public water supply wells. In a wellhead protection area, any contaminant released on or under the ground is expected to eventually reach a public water supply well.

It is important that you read the attached information and consider participating in the development of the wellhead protection program to help prevent contamination of our drinking







Water purveyors in the Spokane area are working together to implement a practical, proactive and protective program for your drinking water. The Federal Safe Drinking Water Act requires that all public water systems using groundwater as their source of drinking water implement a wellhead protection program. The goal of the program is to prevent contamination of our only drinking water source, the Spokane Aquifer.

wellhead protection area is an area where a contaminant released on or under the ground is expected to reach one of our public water supply wells. Your local water purveyors have defined potential wellhead protection areas. Some businesses within these wellhead protection areas have a potential to contaminate the drinking water because of the types of products they use or their processing techniques.

n Washington State, both pollution prevention techniques and management strategies are recommended to protect the aquifer. We will need stakeholders ideas and public input to define these strategies.

Beginning this spring, the City of Spokane and the Spokane Aquifer Joint Board (SAJB) will establish committees, conduct public focus groups, and hold meetings to provide information about groundwater protection issues and invite participation from citizens and businesses about appropriate protection measures. The intent of these activities is to develop a wellhead protection program that will protect your drinking water supply system now and into the future.
