- 2) **NEW!** Regional Water Conservation Collaboration Aug & Sept meeting held thus far @ Ecology; attendees representing DoH, Spokane County, City of Spokane, Liberty Lake, Lands Council, Ecology, Spokane County Conservation District, Center for Justice. First meeting notes attached, outlining existing or planned efforts. Identified target audiences to share water conservation messages with: indoor residential, outdoor residential, indoor institutional / industrial / commercial, Pre K -12 Education, agricultural, regulatory. Monthly meetings planned and a listsery to be established for group notification. Next mtg early November.
- 3) <u>Aquifer Protection Council</u> 7/19 meeting– Geoff Harvey, IDEQ and Dick Martindale, Panhandle Health provided summaries of their aquifer protection and management responsibilities. Panhandle Health has legislative approval to form an Aquifer Protection District and levy an \$8/household fee for the purposes of aquifer protection and to collect biannual business inspection/reinspection fees, including on-site septic systems, which will fund 2 FTEs to inspect businesses. They have 1300 business facilities in their database, with 400 requiring secondary containment.

8/15 meeting – internship posting edited, Julia finalize and distribute to area universities & SCC. Deadline for application is Oct 15th, intern in place by Nov 1st, office located @ Spokane Regional Health District, oversight by SRHD, SAJB, Panhandle Health.

9/19 meeting – discussion of presentation to Board of Health in Nov & Feb to introduce APC and follow up with report on efforts, particularly looking at existing aquifer protection ordinances and adaptations to make them more effective, including consistency between City/County Critical Materials Lists; one applicant for administrative intern position, closing date 10/15. Next mtg.Oct 17, 2:00 @ Liberty Lake Sewer & Water District with Idaho counterparts.

- 4) <u>Irvin Water District</u> Road Products Inc. (RPI) 400' upstream of Well #5 (Cement Rd.), no response from City of Spokane Valley on copies of inspection reports for integrity of and fulfillment of containment area requirements; will do SOCs in Oct, declined SOC testing waiver from DoH, DDW. Regular testing results have been satisfactory, used for ~70% of water production this summer. Ecology efforts and new manager @ RPI resulting in improved communication.
- 5) <u>Spokane County Aquifer Recharge Feasibility Analysis</u> per Bruce Rawls, this document will be incorporated into the Capital Facilities Plan that is in the process of being updated.
- 6) <u>Idaho/Washington Purveyor Meeting</u> Wednesday October 4th, 1:00 p.m. date cancelled, stay tuned for resetting, Location will be @ Panhandle Health District, 8500 Atlas Road, Hayden. 6. ADJOURN

1) CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Directors of the Spokane Aquifer Joint Board (SAJB) met in Regular Session at Pasadena Park Irrigation District No. 17, 9227 E. Upriver Drive, Spokane, Washington on June 22, 2006. President Wick welcomed those in attendance and called the meeting to order at 1:40 PM.

Board of Directors Roll Call and Introductions

President Ty Wick, Vice President Bob Ashcraft, Treasurer Mary McIntyre and Secretary Kathleen Small were in attendance. A total of 22 attended the meeting, 9 SAJB Voting Representatives representing 10 SAJB Members, 1 Non-Voting SAJB Representative, Program Leader Julia McHugh and 11 Guests.

Consideration of Regular Meeting Minutes

President Wick called for any additions, corrections or comments on the Minutes of Mary 25, 2006. The Minutes of May 25, 2006 were approved as presented.

2) FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Treasurer Mary McIntyre reported as follows:

SAJB Administration Funds

The SAJB Checking Account balance is \$5,753.54 and the Spokane County Investment Pool (Wellhead Protection) balance is \$1,210.47.

SAJB Wellhead Implementation Plan (WIP) Funds

The WIP checking balance is \$ 11,487.56, the Spokane County Investment Pool (Implementation) is \$ 48,175.81 and Implementation Savings is \$ 73.55. Treasurer McIntyre provided those present with an income and expense statement January 1, 2006 through June 22, 2006. To date four have not paid the assessment.

Presented/Approved Administration and WIP Bills

President Wick presented the attached Bill Payment Summary for June 2006 - Total \$ 6,637.83. Those present reviewed the summary, discussion followed. Jim Lahde made the motion, and Bob Ashcraft seconded, that the bills be paid accordance with the June 2006 Summary. The Summary detailed Wellhead Implementation Bills of \$ 6,637.83 including the Program Leader Fee, plus mileage and reimbursement, total \$ 4,454.03 for the month of June 2006. President Wick called for the vote, the motion passed unanimously.

President Wick noted for the record that SAJB meetings are not held in July and August, the next meeting will be September 28, 2006. Kathleen Small made the motion, and Jim Lahde seconded that the SAJB Executive Board be authorized to make SAJB decisions from June 23, 2006 through September 27, 2006. President Wick called for the vote, the motion carried unanimously.

4) WELLHEAD PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

<u>Household Contaminant Disposal</u> –Spokane Regional Solid Waste System, Scott Windsor, April '06 to '05 comparison overall tally: collections up 9 to 10 % from 2005, except used motor oil, which decreased - considered weather dependent;

State Dept of Health provided funds for week in April to support a mercury collection event, including 10 days for small businesses to dispose – collected 217 lbs, the best county in Washington; items included blood pressure cuffs, school thermometers, bottles of liquid mercury used as lab or mining reagents.

Education & Awareness – Aquifer booth at South Pines Elementary 5/30; expecting 2nd draft of interpretive signs; Placemat map drafts underway; recount of Lawton Printing donated paper will enable ~100,000 to be printed @ \$.05ea; four entities pledge to contribute, other cost-sharing partners being sought

<u>Website</u> – total website sessions for May 2006 = 1237; updated with Poster Contest winners & Aqua Duck Comic Book #2, which is downloadable from the site

Wellhead Protection Area Committee – June 15 meeting topics: What is acceptable wellhead protection; Within a designated protection area, what do purveyors want to see regulated vs. what's realistic/acceptable to land use regulators; Should a model (and which model) determine the wellhead protection zones, or should a designated distance and configuration be made the standard – while considering that there is a different importance assigned to different wells, whether it is the majority of the system supply or for seasonal or part-time use –> have Districts apply importance factors to each well and reevaluate capture zone size and configuration? Each District to revisit their Capture Zone Contingency Plan (in Vol III, Wellhead Protection Plan); Do we work to regulate land use within wellhead protection zones or activities that take place on the land, including industrial, commercial, storm water and wastewater? Conduct another survey to see if aquifer protection through regulation is palatable to citizens; Invite land use regulators to Aquifer Protection discussions
